

Mini Kettle & Water Dispenser



What is its purpose:

A Mini Kettle is lightweight and ideal for boiling small amounts of water. A hot water dispenser eliminates the need to lift boiling water.

Why might it be helpful:

Smaller kettles have ergonomic handles that allow for a good and easy grip and are lighter, making it far simpler to lift. A hot water dispenser reduces any need to lift and pour. Both are important in risk reduction and safety as well as maintaining independent activity.

Who would benefit from it:

Anyone who may have limited strength or visual impairment.

What are the potential risks:

Risk that the kettle may be used without water and therefore burn dry. Some hot water dispensers have an automatic switch off if the water level is too low.

What do I need to be able to use it:

Both the kettle and hot water dispenser need to be filled regularly. The person still needs to be able to make a hot drink safely and be able to transport it to where they will drink it.

Where can I get one?

How much does it cost?
